


How many years has your camper attended Camp DeWolfe (including this summer)?




How old was your camper this summer?





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








How clear and efficient was the online registration?




How were the session dates for your family?






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




Were camp program rates adequate?





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What session duration would work better for your family next year?



Please explain why you would send your camper to Camp DeWolfe next year?


- Our two children both loved their week at camp. We found the registration process to be seamless, the camp administration both accessible and extremely kind and helpful, and the overall experience to be very positive!




Increased interest in personal time with God, including Bible reading and prayer.





Parent prompt: “Please explain your answers.”


- One of our children struggles with executive functioning and anxiety, which makes peer-to-peer interaction and frustration tolerance an area of challenge. We recognize that these were areas of challenge to him at camp, yet areas that he felt he made progress in! We think that a two week stay would have resulted in more measured improvement. Both of our children were ENTHUSIASTIC about the setting and the opportunities to participate in camp!!! Our daughter said that devotionals were her favorite time of the day:) I know that both children loved the water activities, and expressed satisfaction at what they accomplished over the week.
- My son now enjoys exploring nature and now wants to go back to this camp.
- *My camper* has always been and continues to be a child who makes friends quickly and i was very happy to see his interactions with the kids when we took him to his cabin and also with some of his new friends when we came out for the closing ceremony. It is still a work in progress with respect to the reading time, but we are working on that. He has always been up for a good challenge as well as participation in outdoor activities and i see that continuing.
- *My camper* seems to be more confident after being at camp; and is definitely talking more about God and what he learned about God at camp.
- This is the first year that my son went sailing. He explained the methods used and expressed an interest in continuing to pursue the sport. There was an incident where another camper attacked him physically because of a misunderstanding and he handled the situation positively with the support of his counselor.
- He seems to be more independent.
- It was my son's first time sleep-away camp. He struggled in the beginning, but he was happy and proud that he finished in the end. We were thankful for caring and faithful staff members and appreciated all your time and support. My son took his challenges from the camp and he learned that he accomplished through Christ.
- I think both our girls had amazing times. They have a renewed interest in both religion and outdoor activities
- They learned a lot while being at camp.
- He is already very social and was not in need of development in that area. BUT... he was encouraged to take risks and do things he wasn't initially comfortable with, and discovered new things about himself. He is more willing to do things to take care of himself. You all are fantastic.
- *My camper* loves many outdoor activities and is always encouraging the family to go bike riding and to the beach.
- My son loved all of the activities everything was wonderful. Thank you very much camp Dewolfe

- Both children in their own way in day and overnight camp enjoyed their time. Thank-you Camp DeWolfe for living up to its word in inclusiveness for the campers. I think it will go along way in setting the example for my sons. And thank-you for being a place that my sons look forward to enjoying their summer while they grow closer to God, nature and mankind.

- My son has always enjoyed going to church but he really grew even further in his relationship with God while he was there and the devotional was a great idea, to help me continue this path with him. He learned to be more patient and examined things with his own behavior and that of others from seeing a camper in his bunk that was quite troublesome throughout his stay. His attitude was very positive about even negative things.
- I see great changes in my daughter and am very excited to see what next year brings, LORD willing! She seems to be more patient, caring, attentive and willing to help others!
- *My camper* came back saying that he found the faith formation to be very fundamentalist this year as opposed to previous year. He said there was a huge emphasis on sin. He doesn't want to return to camp again because of that. Our previous experience with camp was that it was a place of grace and joy.
- It is too soon to evaluate these items 4 days after coming home.
- She feels she trusts more in God and others. She has opened her heart up to the teachings in the bible. And she was happy to find those who could help finding answers in her beliefs.
- I noticed *my camper* matured through the process. She also became more expressive with her emotions and thoughts. I used to have to ask, now she is more forthcoming. *My camper* has always been good though now she is more willing and takes initiative helping at home.
- My daughter definitely increased her experience overall by attending the camp; knowing how to survive on her own, and getting ready to experience and explore the "real" and everyday life.


“What were your hopes for your camper while they were at camp? In what ways were these hopes realized or not? What was the highlight? What was most disappointing? Describe any changes you've seen in your camper.”

- We hoped that both of our children would joyfully participate in the community of camp dewolfe, albeit in their own ways, and they most certainly did!! The highlight of camp for both *my camper* and ourselves as parents was when he told us in the car on the way home that "The counselors (especially Kyle and Nate) really made me feel like I belonged there". As parents to a child with ADHD, this made our hearts nearly burst with happiness. *My son* loved the community so much at camp that he actually woke us up early on Sunday to ask us to take him to St. Paul's in Flatbush to see Fr. Hamlin! Of course we were disappointed to hear that he had some struggles during the week, but were endlessly appreciative of the communication with Nate which was constructive and compassionate. The highlight for *my daughter* was that she felt such a closeness to her counselors and her cabin mates. She was sick for the first two days of camp, but told me that her counselors and unit leader, Kathryn, were "so kind to me". Our hope for her was to have a week where she felt empowered and supported to try new things, and she was so happy that she was able to! She was disappointed that she only had a week living and experiencing that type of community. She has faithfully read her devotional with me each night since being home:)
- For the one week away, my son's attitude was calm, relaxed and very easy going. He was more focused.
- That she would grow emotionally and spiritually and develop a sense of independence.
- My hopes for my Grandson while at camp was that he just have fun and from what he has been saying and also from the pictures that were posted he most certainly had fun, and that was very important for me. The highlight for him was the July 4th celebrations on the beach. No disappointments from his stay. Positive changes, in that he loved camp and is already looking forward to returning next year.
- Overall, both *my camper* and I are completely satisfied with his camp experience. Dylan loved his counselor and I and any and all interaction I had with camp staff were positive. The only disappointing thing is that *my camper* didn't get to participate in as many activities we would have liked- such as archery or kayaking. His assignment was to sports and games so he didn't get to participate in the other activities.
- I wanted My son to get away from the city and enjoy the outdoors. He loves electronic devices and not having them available was not an issue. He said that he didn't even miss electronics. The highlight of the camp was getting to know new people. When my son returned, he was more pensive. He was not as quick to react to a situation that would normally make him very upset.



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- My hope was that he would have a good time. And it seems that he did. The highlight was seeing him at the end of the week and hearing his stories about his experience. I believe he has shown greater independence which is a good development step for him.
- I was hoping to unplug my son from technology and to see him enjoy nature and friendships in the camp. He came back very excited about all the new friends he made, and new activities he tried. He is definitely more confident and more matured than before!
- Fun....we wanted her to have fun but at the same time learn.....without knowing she's learning! *My camper* is an only child and while she is warm and giving we wanted her to experience situations where she realizes she isn't the only child in the world. Serving in the dining room, keeping your belongings in order....little things like that make things better for all her bunk mates. When her bunk mates do the same, it was better or *my camper*. Essentially learning to be a better citizen in a community.
- We expected that my son would go through some sad moment since it was his first time trying in sleep away camp. We hoped that my son would take challenges, not give up on doing new things. My son had a bad homesick case, based on what my son and staff members told me. However, he completed and he was very proud himself when he got home. My son learned what the real meaning was and how it really looked like to be patient, caring, positive and motivated even if it was a little hard way for me. We as a parent of him, we are very thankful for all things you've done throughout the camp days.
- Our hope for *our campers* was to get away from indoor electronics and learn to enjoy some outdoor activities plus make some new friends. They accomplished both of those goals. I believe they have new I interest in religious classes that they didn't not have before. We are not a church going family. *Daughter 1* Highlight-making new friends Lowlight- not doing the challenge course/paddleboarding she signed up for Improvement ideas- add a water slide to the beach *Daughter 2* Highlight-challenge course Lowlight- Improvement ideas- outdoor picnic area
- He was totally happy without electronics. He discovered he could try new things. He made good friends and started to trust his own Independence. Everything that summer camp should do. I wish the dates were a little more flexible (he wants to go for more weeks) but that is a minor complaint. Also Age and ethnic diversity was good.
- My camper enjoyed herself, as usual. She was looking forward to participating in certain activities but was disappointed that she wasn't able to do the ones she chose.
- I wanted my daughter to be more spiritual and to be independent and I am seeing definite improvements.
- My hope was that she would grow in confidence and independence, learn to understand others and be empathetic, grateful and helpful. She possesses most of these qualities already. In my opinion this camp is an excellent way to strengthen these qualities. After camp this year I can certainly see growth in these areas. When we picked her up she said camp felt like "it was only a day". She would like to return for 4 weeks next year....I am not sure we are ready for that!!
- I hoped for my son to be happy and have a lot of fun and it was exactly how I thought, when he came home he told me that everything was wonderful.
- Overall *my camper* had a good experience. He only wished the actual camping experience would have been better. It's too hot to camp in the summer, plus too many people in the tent making it even hotter. Another suggest is to take a picture of the cabin group per day, this way all the parents can see their child everyday.
- I wanted for him to mature spiritually. He did on a small scale.
- In the weeks since camp, I have seen growth in personal responsibility and willingness to try new things, eagerness to make new friends, and a desire to worship and serve Jesus.
- See above. And in addition, this year we experienced a bump in the road that seems to have been handled in as best a way as possible. The children were able to continue to enjoy their time with minimal disruption. Communication seems to have been fair under the circumstances to the extent that they are understood. The highlight it always seeing my son again after two weeks, and the anticipation of how he may have changed in that time. Both of my sons have matured in the short three weeks at Camp DeWolfe, are more thoughtful and




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

- *My camper* truly does love camp, he can't wait to come out for the reunion in the fall and of course he's already talking about possibly going for 3 weeks next summer. My hopes for him this summer were that he would make great memories, meet new people, try new things, and grow closer to God and all these things were accomplished and then some.
- My daughter and I live in NYC in an apartment and it's just the two of us. She has no brothers sisters and her dad doesn't live with us. She has a lot of friends but I think she feels a little lonely at home since there are no other kids around. I thought it would be a nice experience for her to be around kids her age all the time. I also liked the idea of her spending a lot of time in a beautiful outdoor setting, close to the water, around trees and grass, and away from the computer, TV and phone because there is just too much of that at home. She said didn't miss her phone at all, which I was thrilled to hear. I also hoped she would have some new experiences, gain some new skills (e.g., archery, sailing) and be a lot more physically active than she is at home. She doesn't play sports and there's a lot of tv & youtube watching at home. I also liked the idea of my daughter getting her first taste at living somewhat independently for the first time, in a safe and positive setting. I think the camp met all of these hopes. Making new close friends was definitely the highlight but also learning how to sail. She said she missed home but she was happy to be there. Her letters were all positive and she said she was having fun. I think she felt a sense of accomplishment that she was able to fend for herself and get along without her mother for the first time.
- To make some new friends, I think he made 1 or 2. Not many campers at camp.
- Build their relationship with good. Build confidence in themselves. New friendships. All of the above were accomplished and exceeded any expectation that I had set. They seem calm and at peace. I am very happy and proud of them.
- *My camper* can be impatient at times. She would shut down and block any consideration of thoughts other than hers. I see some growth in her ability to continue open dialogue when someone does not agree with her. I was concerned about her being an LIT this summer. She can crack under pressure, however she described all of the tasks that she was required to do and she participated with the group.
- I was hoping he would find his camp home and he did. He enjoyed everything that he did. My only disappointment was that he did not do any mountain biking and I wish he had been directed in this path, as I was told avid riders and non riders would be participating. He didn't, because he was fearful of the path. Other than that it was a very successful stay.
- I am beyond pleased with her progress and can only pray that these positive changes help her grow into the beautiful being The Most High made her to be!
- *My camper* at 13 is very much exploring his faith I was hoping that camp would provide him a place to explore and stretch, and not offer rigid answers. He seems now to be less open to God and church than he was when he left.
- I wanted an environment in which she could make her own decisions on God and the teachings of the bible. She came home very happy and found enlightenment with the teachings and environment. She loved archery and kayaking. I was a little disappointed to learn she was sick for the last week. No fault of camp. She just felt it wasn't as fun being sick.
- I truly wanted my daughter to adventure out and explore making new friends, and it seems that she did all of that plus some. My daughter truly enjoyed her stay and had a great experience and time at the camp.
- He developed a deeper relationship with God. When my *camper* returned from camp he was excited to share all he learned in Christian formation.

- I can really and truly only say wonderful things about camp dewolfe. I have loved hearing songs and stories from my children for the last few days. My greatest hope for my children is for them to spend their lives getting to know the generous spirit of God, and recognizing God in themselves and others. I really can't think of a time that this value has been lived more than their week of camp, and our family can't wait to be involved with Camp DeWolfe again in the future.
- Just continue to allow the LORD to be your guide as you map out the strategies for the camp and everything will work out to God's glory.
- The only recommendation I have is to have more flexibility in the activity categories or groups the campers are assigned to. *My camper* would have liked to participate in other activities such as archery and kayaking; instead he was in sports and games for the whole week.
- I would prefer if the campers would bathe everyday.
- He is in day camp and the transition from Explorer sleepover to day camp does not seem to be going well. I am hearing issues with name calling and either being or feeling excluded. We are working on staying positive and working through this challenge. The devotional book that was handed out has been very helpful.
- I was really hoping that he could learn how to ride on bike in camp, but it did not happen this time! I guess he needs more encouragement and help from the counselors.
- The only disappointment we had as parents were her daily activities. Disappointment is actually too strong of a word. We signed her up for sailing and because of limited space she wasn't able to get that activity. We totally understand. We would have liked to pick another activity as opposed to the camp picking a replacement. *My camper* was placed in a swim class that we didn't sign her up for. She has been able to swim on her own since she was a year old and swims competitively year round, so she was really bored with that activity. Again, we totally understand that not all campers can be placed in their first activity choice but we would have liked to pick her second option.
- The first year my daughter went to camp I felt very comfortable with the resident nurse. She was kind and comforting on first impression and my daughter related that in fact she was throughout camp. This summer the resident nurse did not give a good first impression, was not comforting and did not seem to be drinking the Camp DeWolfe Kool Aid. To be honest if this were our first year I would have felt very uncomfortable leaving here at camp after meeting him.
- It would be great if each cabin had ac; a window Ac would suffice and be awesome for them.
- Sounds silly but his ears were filthy.
- The music was difficult to learn and hard for the younger campers. A combination of "real" songs (Hillsong, etc.) with more traditional camp songs or simpler songs could enhance worship. Also, the exclusive use of the male pronoun for God was confusing for some campers (I got a lot of questions about God being a boy). You know have a tiny spokesperson for the camp. If anyone talks to *my camper* for more than 3 minutes, they will hear all about Camp DeWolfe.
- I liked the check in process for Discovery this year. It seemed more like a rolling basis, and the line was formed in the shade out of the direct sun.
- The Sunday drop of Saturday pickup was so much better than last years Friday pickup. Thank you for that change! As far as improvements go parent parking is the only thing I can say needs improvement.
- I would hope that Christian formation could focus more on the Christian values of "love thy neighbor," help those less fortunate and look after each other's needs. I heard from my daughter that there was some mean spiritedness, name calling and pettiness. This sounds like typical middle school behavior but if these values were discussed in Christian formation or during services, I think it would make kids think twice before they called someone a name and would hopefully encourage kids to draw out those who are shy and having a hard time. I also think there should be more sensitivity to those who are really homesick. According to my daughter, homesickness was really a problem with 2-3 kids in her cabin and there was nightly crying, etc. To me it seems troublesome to not allow the child an opportunity to speak to a parent if they are having an especially hard time.



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- Has been always a positive experience My camper just complain about the dress code! A little bit strict
- I am also curious as to what activities are available in arts and crafts, besides lanyards, are there any pottery or glass making or casting, supplies? that would allow the types of things kids make that are forever keepsakes. And I might ask for more turkey options in the menu, however the food was very good!!
- A longer session than 3 weeks would be really helpful, particularly because current schedule bifurcates summer going until what this year would have been August 19 would be awesome!
- Other options should be provided for kids who don't eat pork.
